8.0 COMMISSIONER COMMENT

Mr. Sortman expressed his discouragement over the comments made on a social-media news outlet directed towards elected officials who dedicate their time to Little League as uncles. He defended Commissioner Metzger, highlighting that despite being an uncle at Little League, Mr. Metzger had not missed any meetings regarding the flood disaster. He also dedicated his time at night to the community all while still dedicating his time to his team during the day. Mr. Sortman emphasized that this sort of dedication is honorable and respectable, and the county should be proud. He also acknowledged the contributions of the gas industry to the community, noting that while some may disagree with the industry itself, they active involvement should be recognized as they were the first company to step up and assist during the flood. Lastly, he thanked the first responders and the community for coming together during the flood disaster.

Mr. Mussina, although he did not read those negative comments directed at elected officials, he defended Commissioner Metzger's decision to be an uncle during Little League and added that Mr. Metzger was also present via phone for meetings.

Mr. Metzger shared how some of the Little Leaguers had tears in their eyes from meeting Zero for the first time, and moments like that make it all worthwhile. He thanked everyone for their efforts and support to those affected by the flood disaster. Metzger thanked Secretary Carol for encouraging them, Joe Hamm for not only his presence but for driving Representative Cutler a long way to their meeting, noting that Mr. Cutler's presence was critical as he helps advocate for funding for the area.




