WHEREAS, Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease in children, and;

WHEREAS, 1 in 285 children in the United States will be diagnosed by their 20th birthday, and;

WHEREAS, 46 children per day or 16,790 children per year are diagnosed with cancer in the U.S., and:

WHEREAS, The average age of diagnosis is 6 years old, and;

WHEREAS, 80% of childhood cancer patients are diagnosed late and with metastatic disease, and;

WHEREAS, On average there's been a 0.6 percent increase in incidence per year since the mid 1970's resulting in an overall incidence increase of 24 percent over the last 40 years, and;

WHEREAS, Two-thirds of childhood cancer patients will have chronic health conditions as a result of their treatment toxicity, with one quarter being classified as severe to life-threatening, and;

WHEREAS, Approximately one half of childhood cancer families rate the associated financial toxicity due to out-of-pocket expenses as considerable to severe, and;

WHEREAS, In the last 30 years only six new drugs have been approved by the FDA to specifically treat childhood cancer, and;

WHEREAS, The National Cancer Institute recognizes the unique research needs of childhood cancer and the associated need for increased funding to carry this out, and;

WHEREAS, Hundreds of non-profit organizations at the local and national level including the American Childhood Cancer Organization are helping children with cancer and their families cope through educational, emotional and financial support, and;

WHEREAS, Researchers and healthcare professionals work diligently dedicating their expertise to treat and cure children with cancer, and;

WHEREAS, Too many children are affected by this deadly disease and more must be done to raise awareness and find a cure.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, We, Scott L. Metzger, Chairman, Marc C. Sortman, Vice Chairman, Mark Mussina, Secretary, Commissioners of the County of Lycoming, do hereby proclaim September 2024 as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. We encourage all Americans to observe Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and support this cause that so deeply impacts families in every community across our county and country.





WHEREAS, Hunger and food insecurity are issues of vital concern in Pennsylvania where, according to Feeding America, over 1.5 million individuals, one in eight Pennsylvanians, and one in every six children experience food insecurity. In Lycoming County one in eight neighbors and one in five children are food insecure; and

WHEREAS, Adequate nutritious food has become more expensive and out-of-reach for many neighbors with food costs increasing more than 27%, leading to record demand for charitable food; and

WHEREAS, Food insecurity, the condition of limited or uncertain access to adequate food, is associated with numerous adverse social and health outcomes and is a critical public health issue; and

WHEREAS, Lycoming County is committed to taking steps to combat hunger in every corner of our community, and to provide additional resources to those in need; and

WHEREAS, Lycoming County is committed to working with the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank to educate people about the role and importance of food banks in addressing hunger and raising awareness of the need to devote more resources and attention to hunger issues; and

WHEREAS, The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank distributed over 68.5 million pounds of food in Fiscal Year 2024 to Pennsylvanians experiencing food insecurity. In Lycoming County alone, just shy of 4 million pounds of food were distributed; and

WHEREAS, Public and private entities, including policymakers, business leaders, community activists, farmers, concerned citizens, and hunger relief organizations, must collectively work to address food-insecurity within the Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, the month of September has been designated nationwide as "Hunger Action Month" to raise awareness of the issue of hunger and mobilize our legislature and the public to help end hunger in America.
