#### 5.0 PERSONNEL ACTIONS

5.1 Mike Hagen – Approve the following Personnel Actions as conditional offers of employment, subject to the successful completion of a background check and all other employment conditions as outlined in Attachment (A).

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman  $2^{nd}$  the motion. Approved 3-0 with the exception of the first item which has been eliminated as highlighted by Human Resources Director Michael Hagen.

Commissioner Sortman inquired whether all filled positions are replacements. Michael Hagen confirmed they are all replacement roles. He also mentioned that the prison staffing is nearing full capacity, with approximately nine positions still vacant. Commissioner Metzger praised Lycoming County's recent employment ad campaign and expressed optimism about its effectiveness.

Michael Hagen emphasized that Lycoming County offers an attractive benefits package, slightly better than the state correctional system and comparable to federal benefits, especially when considering partnership health benefits. He stressed the importance of outreach and education in attracting applicants by highlighting county advantages.

#### 6.0 ACTION ITEMS

6.1 Gary Staggert– Vote to approve the Subscription with Verizon for the camera and tracking device for the curbside truck. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Approved 3-0

Commissioner Metzger referenced a past incident involving damage to a county vehicle's mirror, noting that the installed cameras have proven useful in various situations.

6.2 Forrest Lehman – Vote to approve the Agreement with NPC, Inc., to provide mail ballot services for 2026-2029.

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Approved 3-0

6.3 Leslie Kilpatrick—Vote to approve the Data Center Services Support Renewal with Melillo in the amount of \$78,059.29 per year, for three years. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Approved 3-0

Leslie Kilpatrick informed the Commissioners that a one-year agreement for \$110,000 was considered excessive, and efforts were made to secure a longer-term contract at a significantly lower cost.

Commissioner Metzger thanked Leslie Kilpatrick, praising her negotiation skills and highlighting her ability to work with companies to get the best rate for the county.

6.4 Ken George – Vote to approve the Agreement with Pied Piper Pest Control. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Approved 3-0

Commissioner Sortman questioned whether the new agreement with Pied Piper Pest Control was previously in place. Ken George confirmed it's a new contract, prompted by a severe infestation discovered when cleaning the barn. The agreement is for one year.

6.5 Ken George– Vote to approve the Amendment to the Agreement with R & J Ertel extending the terms of the Agreement to December 31, 2025. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman  $2^{nd}$  the motion. Approved 3-0

6.6 Ken George – Vote to purchase HVAC WSHP units from Trane in the amount of \$13,820.00. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman  $2^{nd}$  the motion. Approved 3-0

Commissioner Sortman sought confirmation that water source heat pumps from Trane are compatible with the new system. Ken George affirmed they are.

Commissioner Metzger provided updates on the farm sale process, including dividing the house from the farm, creating an additional lot, and plans to sell the house and lot to generate revenue for the farm. He indicated the sale aims for completion by early September.

6.7 Emily Mrochko – Vote to ratify the 2022-2028 Williamsport Master Planning Open End Agreement with PennDOT.

Mr. Mussina moved to approve. Mr. Sortman 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Approved 3-0

Commissioner Metzger welcomed Emily Mrochko, highlighting her as a new employee in the Planning and Community Development Department.

6.8 Mya Toon – Vote to approve the Agreement with Barbara Bollinger, MD. (2025 approved budgeted item)

Commissioner Metzger explained that RVT has requested two county representatives to expand its board, with Mark Morowski and former Commissioner Rick Mirabito accepting these roles. He expressed appreciation for their willingness to serve and acknowledged the dedication of county board members, emphasizing the importance of their expertise and community involvement.

#### 7.0 COMMISSIONER COMMENT

Commissioner Sortman reflected on the 29th anniversary of the Flight 800 crash, describing it as a tragic event that deeply affected Montoursville. He expressed gratitude that his wife was spared from the flight, viewing the event as a reminder of life's uncertainties and the community's grief.

Commissioner Mussina shared that the anniversary remains somber, recalling the tragic event and its lasting impact, as well as his personal connections to Montoursville, likening the day to the eeriness of Pearl Harbor remembrance. He emphasized the lasting impact on the community and the importance of remembrance.

Commissioner Metzger noted many affected families still reside in Montoursville and recounted a memorial service at Williamsport High School. He highlighted Mayor Giuliani's remarks and the community's resilience. He emphasized the importance of remembering the victims and supporting their families.

#### 8.0 GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Speakers who wish to address the Board of Commissioners will be limited for <u>no more than three (3) minutes</u> on any particular item. The speaker must state his/her name and address for the record. Any deviation from this rule must be approved by the Board Chairman.

Larry Stout announced his retirement from Webb Weekly after 12 years and 688 articles, citing health and family concerns. He expressed gratitude to the Commissioners, department heads, and colleagues, reflecting on his positive experiences and contributions, and wished them well in the future.

Commissioner Metzger thanked Mr. Stout for his eloquent writing and informed Larry how he valued his perspectives and community involvement. Commissioner Metzger expressed best wishes for his health and retirement, acknowledging his contributions and friendship.

Commissioner Sortman commended Mr. Stout's ability to take the high-road in his journalism, highlighting his ability to frame stories positively. He wished him well in retirement, expressing appreciation for his work.

Commissioner Mussina shared that he enjoyed his interactions with Mr. Stout and appreciated his intelligence and leadership, sharing personal anecdotes about Mr. Stout. Despite differing political views, Commissioner Mussina values their friendship and acknowledged Mr. Stout's significant impact on the community and beyond. He expressed regret over his retirement.

Susan O'Brien explained her purpose for attending the meeting to learn about Lycoming County and suggested that the protocol for displaying official nameplates be improved to prevent confusion, noting that her awareness of certain officials was hindered by mislabeling.

Commissioner Metzger thanked Susan O'Brien for making them aware of the mistake.

#### Comments- Cheyenne Bastian Brown

Good morning, Commissioners, and thank you for the opportunity to speak with you today. My name is Cheyenne Bastian-Brown, and I'm honored to serve as the 2025 American Honey Queen. I'm also a proud recent graduate of Penn State University, where I earned a Bachelor of Science in Agricultural and Extension Education. I am a native to Lycoming County being born and raised in the area, growing up alongside the Susquehanna River in Ralston. My academic and personal background have given me a strong foundation in agricultural outreach, and I'm passionate about sharing the importance of bees, beekeeping, and pollinator health with people of all ages and backgrounds.

As the American Honey Queen, I represent the American Beekeeping Federation, an organization that has supported and advocated for the U.S. beekeeping industry since 1943. Through this role, I travel nationwide to engage with communities at fairs, schools, agricultural conferences, and government events to raise awareness of how honey bees contribute to our daily lives, our economy, and our future.

Honeybees arc truly the unsung heroes of agriculture. They are the beginning of our food system, responsible for pollinating more than one-third of the food we eat, including fruits like apples and blueberries, vegetables like cucumbers and squash, and essential crops like almonds and alfalfa. Without honeybees, these foods would be scarcer, more expensive, and in some cases, disappear altogether. In addition to pollination, bees contribute to an entire supply chain from honey producers and small family farms to farmers' markets and food manufacturers. Their work generates over \$20 billion in added value to U.S. agriculture every year. The great honeybee is also responsible for being the very beginning of our food system as alfalfa and other grain crops are used for livestock feed, leading lo various products such as meat and milk needed as proteins throughout the day. Although honeybees are thriving, they still have their challenges. Therefore, there are many ways yourself as well as your constituents can support honeybees, local pollinators, and beekeepers year-round. By planting and supporting pollinator gardens as well as participating and supporting "No Mow May," you are supporting forages for honeybees to consume in the early Spring and Summer. For the beekeeper, I strongly encourage purchasing from local producers, as well as supporting honeybee policy. Everyone can do their part to support the Beekeeping Industry in such small ways.
