

## RETIREE HONORED: Allen Kaplan: GIS/Data Systems Supervisor



Ilen Kaplan began working for LCPC in 1995 where he started the computer mapping and Geographic Information System (GIS) group for the County. Retiring on July 27, 2007, he headed up the GIS Mapping and Computer Applications division for over 12 years. During this time he became a PG (Registered Pennsylvania Geologist). Allen brought corporate efficiency, productivity and customer service to local government. Allen used the computer to build 3-d visualizations of future developments including wind farms and quarries. Allen is proudest of the capabilities, pleasant work environment and accomplishments that his GIS Mapping and Computer Applications team members have made.

He is proud to be a native of "the port" and for 36 years has been married to Jill (see photo at left) who currently teaches English to learning disabled students at Montoursville Area High School. Allen is a graduate of Penn State University (BS Science) and University of Cincinnati (MS Geology). He was a computer applications geologist for Phillips 66 Petroleum Company for fifteen years. While stationed overseas Allen developed computer mapping and modeling of deep oil field reservoirs for Europe and Africa. He also worked in Odessa, Texas; Houston ,Texas; and in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

Wanting to return to Pennsylvania he was employed as senior CADD (Computer Aided Drafting and Design) computer support engineer for 3-d plant design at Air Products and Chemicals in Allentown, Pa. In 1993 Allen and his family returned home to Williamsport area for a better quality of life. He spent a year designing and remodeling his current home and Allen taught physics and astronomy at Penn College as an adjunct professor.

Allen and his wife Jill have three children who attended schools in London (UK), Houston, Allentown and then all graduated from Montoursville. Presently Matthew is a lawyer with Pepper Hamilton in Wilmington Delaware. Heather is a graduate student in education at Penn State. Gerald teaches ceramics at Hilton Head High School and will earn a Master of Education in August 2007.

As a member of our community, Allen has not only promoted the sharing of County GIS knowledge, but volunteers as a fireman and an EMT with the Plunketts Creek Township Fire Department. He is an amateur radio operator with the County's Disaster Communications Service.

Duane was not here at RMS when I first came on board. He was recuperating from major surgery, and was off for several months. Duane had advised us that he would not be able to return to the rigors of operations.

Anxious to get started and reorganize things, I approached Harry about ideas to reorganize RMS.

I asked him if he would lead the Operations Division. He accepted the challenge. Harry was a veteran equipment operator that possessed respect for the work that was performed here at RMS. Also, Harry's reputation was well known for his even handed way in which he worked with the men. To my way of thinking Harry just seemed a natural to manage the Operations Division of RMS.

After four years working in the revamped RMS organization and the administrative oversight that had developed through RMS Division Management, Harry came to me and stated that his first love of the job was equipment operation and that his current duties took him further away from equipment than he wanted. He asked for a change in the Operations Division management. Siting foremost that he did not want to create a problem, as he understood the need for the management tasks, however, he stated he wanted to return to the field to operate equipment.

September 2001 Harry returned to the field, as a Special Projects Coordinator/Equipment Operator, a job he has held to retirement.

Stepping down from the management of the Operations Division could have become a major stumbling block, but not for Harry Bryson. He held the needs of RMS above his own and only wanted to create the change to return to his longed for duties, operating equipment again. Dave Bonus, Harry's successor and at the time the Supervisor of the Equipment Operators, has stated that the transition while it could have generated issues, it never did, and that he and Harry formed a lasting friendship and a genuine mutual respect for their respective talents.

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The County has been well served by Harry's efforts, his experience, and his leadership here at RMS. He is the type of employee that only comes around once in while. The lasting impressions of Harry Bryson will always be the quiet strength of his character and his dedication to harmony in the work place. Few lead by true example, but Harry is one in a million, the exception, that is leaving a legacy at RMS, if emulated will bring about future and continued success of the organization.

#### Drought Watch for Lycoming County

Although Lycoming County received rain over the past weeks, the county is one of 58 that are in a drought watch. At this stage, users are requested to reduce water consumption by 5%. The top 5 actions that impact this situation are:

- Stop Leaks check for leaks at facets, garden hoses, sinks and washing machines connections.
- **Check Toilets** toilets manufactured after 1994 use only 1.6 gallons of water per use. If you have older toilets, consider replacing this is the largest water user in your home.
- **Replace Older Washers** this is the second largest user of water in you home.
- **Lawns** water lawns or plants in the early morning or near darkness, to minimize evaporation.
- Porches/Driveways consider using a broom instead of using a hose to wash down sidewalks.
  Please consider these conservation tips, until the watch is lifted.
